

THE PAST, PRESENT AND **FUTURE OF MEDICINE**

Medicine is the art and science of healing. In ancient times, herbs, animals and minerals were used as medicines by religious godmen and priests, who were considered healers and curers. They were known to perform miracles, save people's lives and appeal to god in a quest to obtain the truth. Soon the Greek physician Hippocrates, the Father of Medicine, categorized illnesses as acute, chronic, endemic and epidemic. This provided the first rational approach to the art of curing and treating illnesses. Eventually some great surgeons of ancient



times like Galen of Greece, began performing ambitious and risky brain and eye surgeries using primitive tools and having only limited knowledge of medical science. From this point on, as science and technology slowly developed, medicine became more reliant upon medications. The first antibiotic, arsphenamine was then discovered by Paul Ehrlich. Thus a method to tackle bacterial infections was devised and more and more antibiotics against specific strains of bacteria were created. Various vaccines and pharmaceuticals such as aspirin soon came into existence as well.

In ancient times, plant extracts and products were used to treat people in severe pain, fighting for their lives. This traditional method of treatment is referred to as herbalism, which is now redundant. Modern biotechnology has made it possible to create drugs targeted towards specific physiological processes with reduced side effects. All this has resulted in a much higher life expectancy and improved quality of life. Development in modern genetics and molecular biology has made it possible to pin point exactly which gene is defective in a particular monogenic genetic disorder. Medical technology, practice and decision-making is at a much higher level than what it was just 20 years ago which shows how medical science always seems to keep improving, without any boundaries.

The 20th century has been described as the century of molecular biology and medical science. Cancer-killing nano-particles, fat fighting nucleic acids and many more breakthroughs are set to transform the face of health care. Obesity and diabetes will be problems easy to tame and control. A drug against the constantly mutating common cold virus may also hopefully be developed and we would bid runny noses goodbye! Medical science is set to get far more rational and preventive than ever before! Perhaps the most intriguing aspect is the predictive power of medicine. The possibility of a disease developing in an individual will be determined and appropriate preventive measures would then be taken. It would also be possible to check an individual's current health status and monitor the functioning of his/her organ systems. Another crucial aspect would be providing information about the detrimental effects of certain environmental factors on an individual's genes such as sunlight, which could cause skin cancer.

With powerful new systems and technologies, complex diseases such as Alzheimer's, diabetes, cancer and obesity will be treated with new and improved drugs and therapeutic methods. Thus, it is clear that the field of medicine is growing from strength to strength and is definitely one of the brightest prospects for the coming years! As Thomas Edison once famously said, "The doctor of the future will give no medicine but will interest his patients in the care of the human frame, in diet and in the cause and prevention of disease."

Wonder - The Seed of Science

Eureka! The cry of the Greek scientist Archimedes is etched firmly in our minds, as is the story that goes with it. Wrestling with a problem posed to him by King Hiero II, Archimedes, while having his bath realized that the water displaced by him was equal to his mass. This gave rise to the Archimedes principle, using which Archimedes could tell the King whether his crown was made of pure gold or not. This story serves to highlight an important aspect of Archimedes character - his elation and joy on unveiling even the smallest of Nature's secrets. Newton shared the same zest and enthusiasm for science as did Archimedes. Though countless people had seen an apple fall from a tree, few (if any) wondered



why. Newton not only questioned this natural phenomenon but also made several daring assumptions, which proved to be a turning point in science and led to Newton's Law of Universal Gravitation. Newton buttressed his beliefs with precise calculations, worked persistently, careless of food and sleep. Archimedes and Newton were scientists who recast their work from an exercise in cold rationality to an aesthetic experience. They reveled in the difficult work of teasing truth out of a reclusive nature, and experienced frequent moments of awe and wonder.

"In Wonder all Philosophy began: in Wonder it ends."

Much of scientific passion is summed up in that childlike but infinitely complex word wonder. Plato argued that the notion of wonder was central to all philosophical and scientific thought, "In Wonder all Philosophy began: in Wonder it ends." Einstein concurred with this sentiment and thought that anyone incapable of standing rapt in awe, blind to wondrous nature was as good as dead. "I do not know what I may appear to the world," Newton said before he died, "but to myself I seem to have been only like a boy playing on the sea-shore, and diverting myself in now and then finding a smoother pebble or a prettier shell than ordinary, whilst the great ocean of truth lay all undiscovered before me." His words echo his wonder and fascination with the world around him and serve as a reminder to us to understand and revel in the infinite patterns of nature.


Bazzinga!



CRICKET FRENZY



The problem is not that our 'boys' have been playing *too much* cricket. It's that they haven't been playing cricket. They've been playing advertising driven, media orchestrated, high decibel abbreviated formats, namely IPL, where focus, concentration, technique and staying power count for little. You belt sixes over shortened boundaries, swank in and out in perhaps 30 balls, yet swagger all the way to the bank with \$2MM! Some players have done IPL seasons but skipped going to the West Indies just before difficult tours. Others, when 'tired' took their 'break' from playing for the country. They played in the IPL, though, injuries and all. England and Australia were disasters waiting to happen. Just weeks ago, the pundits speculated that this was our best chance ever to beat Australia in Australia. Our best team possible! Did the best team ever age in weeks? What happened? IPL happened – and happened *long before* the disaster tours. A team full of players carrying injuries, playing 90 days of sub-standard club-level cricket happened. That prepares you only for more sub-standard stuff, year after year, not cricket at the highest levels. They continue playing there with injuries because the BCCI-IPL has brought big bucks to the private-owned side of the sport. The system and gene pool of Indian cricket have been and are being radically altered for the worse. We need to think about how to revive the domestic game, rescue cricket from the billionaires club and restore it to the public domain. And trust me, advertising led big money came into Indian cricket due to its performance; it will soon pull out, as public at large have little interest in following a losing team.

R.I.P. NIPPY

Whitney Elizabeth Houston,

affectionately christened "Nippy" by her father, was born on August 9, 1963. She was found lifeless, submerged in her bathtub, on February 11, 2012, hours before the 2012 Grammy Awards. "The voice of an angel

stilled by life's demons"- wisely headlined by The Age (Melbourne) - is a sentence that proficiently exemplifies the heartfelt passion and burning sentiment people felt on this tragic day for the deceased artist, actress and model.

Houston was a formidable singer. She was one of the world's best-selling music artists, having sold over 170 million albums, singles and videos globally. She released seven studio albums and imbued several African-American female artists with the desire to follow in her glorious footsteps. Her debut in acting was as the star of the feature film 'The Bodyguard' (1992). The film's original soundtrack won the 1994 Grammy Award for Album of the Year. Its lead single "I Will Always Love You" became the best-selling single by a female artist in music history and is unquestionably Whitney's paramount. She was a mezzo-soprano and was baptized "The Voice" in reference to her incomparable vocal talent. Her every performance was dizzying, mesmerizing and unparalleled. In a world where music is swiftly and dreadfully turning unnatural and computerized, it is deplorable to lose a performer whom no one could rival in exquisite vocal fluidity, purity of tone, and ability to infuse a lyric with compelling melodrama.

The cause of the celebrity's death is undetermined. Whether her demise was accidental or not is still ambiguous. After her marriage to musician Bobby Brown in 1992, Houston allegedly slipped into substance abuse. Her only daughter, Bobbi Kristina Houston Brown, born in 1993, was hospitalized twice following the news of her mother's passing. Whitney's tainted reputation initiated a wide array of semi-fabricated and rushed conclusions. I however, firmly deem it unreasonable, unjust and unmerited not to respect the remarkable gift this woman possessed. I for one am inconsolable, knowing that another exceptional artist will not be given the recognition she deserves. Here ends my feeble attempt to pay her tribute. Whitney Houston, I will always love you.

Dhananjaya Chak, Green House Captain of the Batch of 2003, now plays county cricket in England. Having played for the Jesters and Roehampton clubs, he was even invited to play for I Zingari, one of the oldest, most prestigious amateur cricketing clubs in England. This is what he had to say to the Editorial Board.

NL: What inspired you to become a cricketer? Dhananjaya: Sachin Tendulkar. It was a game we

always played. I played in school, college, I played for the under-17 Haryana team and for an under-19 Gurgaon team.

NL: How did you start playing cricket in England?

Dhananjaya: I went to NALSAR (in Hyderabad) to study law and was recruited by a firm in London. In London my colleagues played cricket and so, naturally I started playing with them.

NL: How do the skills of the cricketers in England compare to those in India?

Dhananjaya: The players are on the same level. The physical levels of cricketers in India and England are different, though in cricket this doesn't matter.

NL: How do the pitches in England compare to those in India?

Dhananjaya: The pitches in India are easy to bat on. One can free his front foot, and *hit* the ball. The leather ball comes on to the bat.

However, in England the ball swings. It is harder to play on and the ball rarely comes on to the bat.

NL: What is your favourite cricketing memory? Dhananjaya: When I was in class 12, in the YPS tournament, 5 runs

were required off the last ball. I hit the ball for a six!






